

Envision the Parish

We make a distinction between the purpose of the parish and the vision that exists as a result of the purpose. Additionally, we answer the question of "how" the parish operates through an examination of values.

Purpose

Remember, PURPOSE answers the question "Why?"

Answers to questions associated with the parish's purpose may seem obvious, but they are not. In a changing environment, it is important to reconsider our reason for existence, our significance, and the critical role the parish plays in building the Kingdom of God.

Why does the parish exist?

Why is the parish important in the diocese? (What difference would it make if the parish no longer existed?)

Why does the parish do what it does, through the grace of God?





Craft the Parish Statement

Values

Remember, VALUES answer the question "How?"

Value-

an enduring belief that guides your behaviors, decisions, and actions

Much as *Purpose* answers the question "why?" and *Vision* answers the question "where?" *Values* answer the question "how?" In other words, "how" will the parish behave, decide, and act?

By identifying, defining, and proclaiming your parish values, you provide clarity for overall behavior and decision making. Understanding and proclaiming values provides the ability to act with integrity and consistency.

How does the parish exemplify what it stands for?

How will the Parish Leadership Team make decisions that inspire its people?

How do the parish's values serve the parishioners?

Vision

Remember, VISION answers the question "Where?"

A vision is a picture or image of where the parish/ministry will be in 5 years. It is an image of what the purpose being fulfilled during the next five years looks like. A "vision" is what you see.

The Vision for your parish is shared by the entire Parish Leadership Team—and ultimately, the entire parish—that applies for a specified time period. We recommend a 5-year vision. This thematic goal serves to focus the parish staff, key volunteers, and parishioners and provides an objective tool for resetting direction when things get out of sync.



Diocese of Kalamazoo: Mutually Shared Vision

The sample below is an actual vision document from the Diocese of Kalamazoo. Though a vision document for a diocese is obviously on a larger scale than the one you will create for your parish, the concept is the same. As you review the sample, consider how you could utilize a similar "Mutually Shared Vision" with and for the people in your parish. Note that Purpose, Values, and Vision are all included.



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Scriptures That Reveal the Vision of Jesus

Good News to the Poor

When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." (Luke 4:16-21)

Jesus' vision is to be an agent of God's Kingdom. In Luke's perspective, this fulfills the vision of Isaiah, which promises a kingdom of freedom and favor, especially to the poor and marginalized.

Commitment

And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20)

The risen Christ does not intend to leave his disciples alone. As the Church continues her work of announcing the gospel, Jesus' vision is to remain present. His commitment to his followers is the assurance of love and of final victory.

Love

"Father, I desire that those also, whom you have given me, may be with me where I am, to see my glory, which you have given me because you loved me before the foundation of the world. Righteous Father, the world does not know you, but I know you; and these know that you have sent me. I made your name known to them, and I will make it known, so that the love with which you have loved me may be in them, and I in them." (John 17:24-26)

Jesus' vision is to call his disciples into the very life of God. Through his ministry, he intends to lead his followers into the divine love which unites him to his Father.

Scriptures That Reveal the Vision of the Early Church

An Example of Goodness

"You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lamp stand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." (Matthew 5:14-16)

The early church envisioned itself as a light to the world. Through its actions of justice and service, it would reveal the presence of the God who had acted powerfully through Jesus.

Constant Forgiveness

"Be on your guard! If another disciple sins, you must rebuke the offender, and if there is repentance, you must forgive. And if the same person sins against you seven times a day, and turns back to you seven times and says, 'I repent,' you must forgive." (Luke 17:3-4)

The early church envisioned itself as called to constant forgiveness. It was to be the agent of reconciliation by extending forgiveness without limit. Because through Jesus the community had been reconciled to God, the church could not refrain from forgiving others.

Service to Each Other

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you." (John 13:12-15)

The early church envisioned itself as called to serve because Jesus had served them. Since the Master was a servant, even to the point of laying down his life, the church must place service in its essential mission.



Prayerfully Consider Your Vision

At prayer, envision for your parish. During this time of solitude, review the following points. Feel free to take notes during your prayer time.

- Invite the Holy Spirit to be with you.
- Seek counsel and direction for your Parish.
- Ask for strength to assist you in leadership.
- Ask for guidance in creating this vision of a healthy and holy parish.
- Consider the scripture that reveals the vision of Jesus and the early church.
- Envision where you'd like your parish to be in five years.


